### A Message from Michael Nunez, District Chief Financial Officer






Fiscal 2022 was another, consecutive year of growth and efficiency throughout University Medical Center of El Paso as many of our departments, such as maternal care, endoscopy, vascular surgery, stroke, and cardiac care showed surprisingly resilient and consistent growth. Similarly many of the same increases in revenues at our El Paso Children's Hospital were related to service line growth, patient census and efficient use of resources – especially in the second six months of fiscal 2022. As shown below, these increases are impressive.

- UMC Births increased 37%
- UMC ER Visits increased 25%, primarily from the satellite ERs
- UMC Outpatient Visits increased 11%
- El Paso Health surpassed 100,000 Medicaid members
- Children's Admissions increased 25%
- Children's ER visits increased 98%
- Children's Outpatient visits increased 34%


Both UMC and EPCH could have further increased revenue and care for the year with greater capacity. Toward the end of 2022, EPCH was completely filled with patients in need of care. Overall, as directors and departments at both hospitals worked within their budgets to provide and expand care, the District proved again it is a model of efficiency and fiscally responsible steward of its resources and those of the County of El Paso.



### A Message from Carol Smallwood, President & CEO of El Paso Health





Dear Members, Providers, Associates, and Stakeholders, Thank you for your interest in El Paso Health.

This Annual Report is designed to highlight our performance over the fiscal year ending September 2022. We hope you enjoy reviewing it. In this letter, I will provide a brief snapshot of El Paso Health's achievements during the past year.

To begin, let me say it is an honor to return to El Paso Health. I had the pleasure of serving the predecessor company, El Paso First Health Plans, from 2006 to 2013. Returning to this organization last year, I continue to be impressed with its growth and the integrity of the people who work here. El Paso Health's team associates share my passion and commitment to healthcare in our community, and I look forward to continuing our work together to provide access to quality healthcare for all.

In 2022, El Paso Health maintained its role as market leader in the El Paso community with a 59.5% market share of STAR and CHIP in the El Paso service delivery area – 19.2% over our competitors. To date, we serve 103,686 Members across all programs and have increased net revenue by 37.95%, compared to the same period in 2021. This growth is noteworthy because while the pandemic was declared over, many challenges associated with COVID-19 remained during the year. Retaining a #1 leadership position is never easy, but we managed to do so through the unparalleled dedication of our leadership, staff, network

providers, the continual enhancements to our member programs, and innovative collaboration with our partners. I am very proud of the entire El Paso Health team.

One of El Paso Health's goals during the year was to better monitor and address the social determinants of healthcare in our region — especially coming out of the pandemic. Research shows that health outcomes are driven by numerous factors outside the healthcare system — things like socioeconomic status, education, physical environment, employment, social support networks, as well as access to health care. And while access is a key factor, it was our goal during the year to help our Members address other needs as well. I am proud to say that our team at El Paso Health began to develop Member programs that incorporate assistance for many of these social determinants. Some of those programs are additional services that help our Members lead safer, healthier lives.

Other areas of success during the year include:

- Million Pounds of Hope
- Back to School Backpack Give-Away
- Car Seat Safety Program
- Community partnerships with local non-profits

It is efforts like these that have helped El Paso Health to become one of the most trusted health plans in El Paso. Since our founding in 2001, what was then known as El Paso First Health Plans held to the belief that no single entity could strengthen the delivery of healthcare in our

community and promote access to quality healthcare for all. Since that time, El Paso Health has stayed true to its original mission. We have developed successful programs with our providers and partners in order to deliver the best possible health plans and related services to our Members. In turn, our Members trust us, and that is what our brand reflects today. I am convinced our goal of gaining and maintaining trust — with Members, partners, and stakeholders — will continue to guide us successfully in the future.

In closing, let me add that we are extremely proud to be El Paso's only locally-owned managed care organization. As such, we never forget that it is our responsibility to provide quality health care programs to the underserved in our community. I believe in 2022 we stayed true to that responsibility and affected the lives of many people. ### A Message from Abigail Tarango, Executive Director UMC, EPCH Foundations









Our borderland region has turned disruption and challenges into resilience and a catalyst for good. Throughout 2022, the gift of giving in people shined through, and we remain grateful to El Paso - the place we call home. University Medical Center Foundation of El Paso and the El Paso Children's Hospital Foundation embrace this generosity to address the community's health care needs. We simply could not have achieved as much without you. Indeed, 2022 was a year of great strides and impact.

This year, we helped fund much-needed medical equipment, support lifesaving services, and programs, and brought prestigious fellowships to our medical professionals. We provided direct and ancillary patient services, such as access to medicine and treatment, clothing and supplies, and much more. For example:

The UMC Infusion Center, the Sobreviviendo el Cáncer/ Surviving Cancer Program provides psychosocial support and short-term financial funding for low-income and indigent cancer patients. Many patients diagnosed with cancer were facing financial challenges before their sudden illness. The goal of the program is to identify and assist with challenges that may interfere with a patient's treatment plan.

The El Paso Health Car Seat Safety Program is designed to provide free, monthly car seat safety events with the mission of improving safe travel for children in the greater El Paso area. Certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians provide car seat evaluations, free car seats to families in need, instruction on car seat installation, and child passenger safety education. The

program distributes approximately 450 car seats to families each year.

The Child Life Services at EPCH promotes better self-management education among children and their families throughout their health care experience. Child life specialists and support staff provide developmentally appropriate, trauma-informed education and care, as well as conduct age-appropriate play-based activities for children, encouraging creativity and self-expression among children.

The Therapeutic Arts program at EPCH is where various activities are provided to children and adolescents in order to increase care compliance, reduce anxiety and stress among patients and their families, and strengthen support among siblings and peers. The program is designed to enrich quality time among children that are hospitalized with guided art and music sessions led by local artists.

It is our firm belief that the people in our region should not have to leave home to get the quality care they need and deserve. As such, serving as philanthropic and charitable arms of the El Paso County Hospital District, the Foundations are committed to the success of both hospitals and outpatient clinics. By building viable working relationships with supporters and acquiring monetary and in-kind resources, the Foundations' work helps families overcome barriers with viable pathways to health access and equity. The grants awarded to the Foundations and longstanding partnerships with major private and corporate donors truly exemplify a united and growing commitment within our community to provide high-quality

health care to all who come to our hospitals and our outpatient clinics. We also depend on our volunteers and advocates to reach the highest standards of healing, education, and research.

Additionally, 2022 was an opportune year for educating and empowering the community about the many health and human services that our District and its regional partners provide. Our overarching goal is to work collaboratively with those that are committed to the high-quality care of our patients and families by expanding our capacity to serve. 
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

Center Receives Prestigious
Membership Into The Society for
Vascular Surgery VQI Registry



UMC Healthcare Partners Vascular and Endovascular Surgery Center received membership into the Society for Vascular Surgery VQI (Vascular Quality Initiative) Registry, a first for the region.

"It is with great joy I announce UMC is now part of the Society for Vascular Surgery VQI (Vascular Quality Initiative) Registry," said Gilbert Aidinian, M.D., Division Chief, Vascular and Endovascular Surgery, Texas Tech Physicians of El Paso, Surgery Department and UMC. "This is a great leap for UMC and TTP El Paso Vascular Surgery, since we are now part of the 945 participating centers in this registry and first in the region."

UMC Healthcare Partners Vascular and Endovascular Surgery Center, at 10410 Vista Del Sol, opened in February of 2022 to give El Paso a higher level of vascular surgery care to serve the community and its region.





# Jaime Gasco, M.D., Performs Specialty Surgery in El Paso at UMC Spine Center

Dr. Jaime Gasco, Neurosurgeon, UMC Spine Center performs specialized outpatient procedures, particularly the Oblique Lateral Lumbar Interbody Fusion (OLLIF), designed to improve instability in the back without the removal of tissue or anything natural; and the Sacroiliac Joint Fusion, designed to fix a joint commonly affected in women who have had numerous childbirths and presents as low back pain. He is the only Inspired Spine-Certified neurosurgeon in Texas doing these procedures.

UMC's Spine Center has the largest team of all board certified and board eligible neurosurgery medical staff in the region as it continues to bring the higher level of care to El Paso, West Texas and Southern New Mexico.



# ONE OF ONLY 13 IN THE NATION: UMC Hosts Head & Neck Microvascular Reconstructive Surgery Fellowships

In July 2022, with the support of UMC leadership and the medical directorship of Hans Brockhoff II, DDS, MD, FACS, Fellowship Director, UMC Foundation of El Paso announced a \$45,000 commitment by KLS Martin to assist with the establishment of the El Paso Head & Neck and Microvascular Reconstructive Surgery Fellowship. The fellowship is one of only 13 in the entire United States for Oral and Maxillofacial surgery. The program represents the only fellowship-trained head & neck and microvascular reconstructive surgeons in El Paso. The focus is in the treatment and management of both benign and malignant neoplasms of the face and neck.

"Dr. Brockhoff has helped build a standard of care not available elsewhere in the region, and because of his commitment and dedication, many patients no longer need to seek medical treatment outside of our region when faced with cancer of the head and neck."

# EL PASO'S FIRST MINIMALLY INVASIVE SURGERY: Dr. Adam Adler and UMC Revolutionize Hip Replacement



El Paso's first minimally invasive sacroiliac joint reduction and fusion with the iFuse TORQ implant system was performed Dr. Adam Adler, Department of Orthopedic Surgery, Texas Tech Physicians of El Paso, and Assistant Professor of Trauma and Hip Reconstruction at Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center (TTUHSC). This is another University Medical Center of El Paso first. In doing so, Dr. Adler ushered-in an evolution toward total hip replacement as the standard of care for hip fractures.

"UMC is the only hospital in El Paso that is a Level 1 Trauma Center and that has the capability of having a full-time orthopedic traumatologist," said Dr. Adler. "This is where the iFuse-TORQ comes into play and why UMC is on the leading edge in hip fracture care."





**UMC** Welcomes First Portable MRI System to the Region

At the end of 2022, University Medical Center of El Paso announced another advancement in healthcare as the region's first portable MRI (magnetic resonance imaging) system goes into operation. The system, known as the Swoop, is revolutionizing MRI scanning by bringing the MRI system to patients, at bedside.

"This is another advanced tool our providers have to have scans done for patients who are too sick or unable to be transported downstairs for imaging," said Greg Erickson, Assistant Administrator Ancillary Services. "This is a system that brings healthcare in El Paso another step forward, in line with what we are seeing in some of the top healthcare systems in the nation. For the last month, we have been training 25 UMC Associates to operate the system and now, in time for Christmas, it's ready for patients."

Initially, the Swoop system will be used for follow-up scans on patients with brain injuries or otherwise being treated for brain issues in UMC's Neuro ICU Department. "Not only does this bring added conveniences, but it also expedites our ability to provide MRI's when medically necessary. This brings the system to the patient, in minutes," added Erickson. The Swoop system is small enough to fit in elevators and through doorways, making it very maneuverable in large, busy hospital environments, such as UMC.





# First Class Graduates UMC Training Tracks Program

Twenty-three UMC Associates graduated from the inaugural class of the UMC Training Tracks program, a specialized program created to assist new managers promoted from within the hospital or who have recently joined UMC. "As a team, we are excited to offer this opportunity to the UMC Management for their continued success," said Monica Armendariz, Manager of Training and Development. # Neurosurgery/Spine Center Presents Zero Infection Rate Out Of 234 Cranial Procedures



UMC's Neurosurgery/Spine Center has been recognized for recent findings by the Standardized Infection Rate (SIR) statistics showing UMC at a better than national experience for a zero infection rate of 234 cranial procedures performed during the Fourth Quarter/Fiscal Year 2021 (and calendar year 2021).

According to the National Healthcare Safety Network (NHSN), the Standardized Infection Ratio (SIR) is a statistic used to track healthcare-associated infections (HAIs) over time, at a national, state, or facility level. The SIR compares the actual number of HAIs at each hospital, to the predicted number of infections.

### Patients assisted by the American Cancer Society Transportation Grant



"American Cancer Society is dedicated to removing barriers to care and improving health equity for patients with cancer.

One of our programs to address these concerns is our Patient Transportation Grant program.

Patient Transportation Grants are funds awarded to health systems or health system foundations to help cancer patients with transportation barriers get to and from cancer-related treatment appointments."

- A 32-year-old diagnosed with Colorectal Cancer and receiving treatment at UMC Infusion Center was referred to the Foundation. More specifically, we utilized the Sobreviviendo El Cancer program for hardship with transportation and medical expenses. As the primary financial provider, the patient was impacted because he could not continue providing for his family due to his medical condition. The patient was assisted with gas cards, made possible by an American Cancer Society grant awarded to the Foundation for this kind of need. Additionally, through other oncology grants, the patient received co-payment assistance. He was also referred to the El Paso County General Assistance for mortgage assistance and received SNAP benefits.
- A 26-year-old male diagnosed with leukemia receives treatment at UMC-Infusion Center and needs a bone marrow transplant. The patient was referred to Sobreviviendo El Cancer for assistance applying at a tertiary hospital. Due to his medical condition and treatment plan, the patient had to stop working and move in with his parents to help with the medical expenses. He was accepted at MD Anderson and is currently looking for a bone marrow donor. Nonetheless, the patient expressed financial hardship in covering all the travel expenses to Houston, TX. With the American Cancer Society grant, the patient was assisted with gas cards to help him travel to MD Anderson and to continue with the cancer treatment at UMC.

#### **Compassionate Care Fund**



- An EPCH patient was two months old when his social worker requested assistance, the Compassionate Care, a Foundation program, fulfilled the request. The patient's mother was 18 years old and caring for her 15-year-old sister and her newborn baby. While preparing the patient for discharge, the social worker identified the family's challenges. The patient's mother had fallen behind on electric bill payments after birth and was in danger of having their electricity shut off. The family also needed assistance with diapers, wipes, and baby clothes. Compassionate Care assisted with their utility, baby clothes, diapers, wipes, and a baby blanket for the baby to be comfortably cared for at home after discharge.
- A 54-year-old UMC patient was referred to Compassionate Care, a Foundation program, by her social worker. The patient's home had burned down and was inhabitable. The patient shared that the fire destroyed all belongings, and only a few clothing items had been salvaged. The patient and her children did not have jackets for the fall and winter weather. Providing the patient with a Walmart gift card to purchase immediate and much-needed items, such as clothing and jackets, was a small start to helping her and her children.
- A 3-week-old EPCH NICU patient was referred to Compassionate Care for assistance with a playpen to sleep in and diapers. The patient's mother did not have a support system and reported to EPCH staff that she co-sleeps with the patient. Compassionate Care, a Foundation program, provided a playpen and diapers for the baby to use after discharge to reduce any risk of SIDS and encourage sleeping separately.

### **Project C.A.R.E.** (Community Access to Rehabilitation Equipment)



"Durable medical equipment donated to us doesn't stay around for very long. We receive the donation and often just as fast as a request is made by a social worker at UMC on behalf of someone who needs it."

A 42-year-old patient was admitted to UMC due to Pulmonary Fibrosis and Cough Dyspnea. Before this hospitalization, the patient was fully independent. However, due to their condition and a three-month-long hospital stay, the patient became debilitated and lost mobility. Upon discharge, the patient was to move in with elderly parents committed to caring for the patient. UMC Foundation assisted by providing the patient with a luxury full electrical hospital bed, a wheelchair, a commode, and an air-loss mattress. The equipment was donated to Project C.A.R.E., a Foundation program, and we delivered, set it up, and helped this patient on their road to recovery.



# Story Of A Man, An Oil Rig — And A Frankenstein Moment Expertly Handled by Dr. Shawn Diamond



Working atop an oil rig in Texas can be intense, difficult and sometimes dangerous. David Jacobs, a 29-yearold from Corpus Christi, was in his third week on the rig, near Odessa, when he found out just how dangerous working on an oil rig can be.

In February, David donned his work boots, hardhat and pulled on his

leather gloves. Later that day, David's name was added to a long list of oil field injuries. His gloves were removed from his hands but inside one of the gloves was David's right thumb. David was then flown to UMC.

Waiting there was Shawn Diamond, M.D., Microsurgeon, Department of Surgery, Texas Tech Physicians of El Paso, one of the foremost hands specialists in the region. Within minutes of his arrival, David headed into incredibly complex surgery to bring life back to the thumb, where it belonged, back on David's hand.

"That's not dissimilar," said Dr. Diamond, "to what we see almost on a daily basis at UMC. We are the only place that can really say if it can or cannot be reattached."

# **UMC's Rehab Outpatient Team Cheers On Teen Patient Who Won't Quit**



Sixteen-year old Bryan Iverson and his mother, Martha, decided to go to the gym together. Bryan began lifting weights and soon he began vomiting and lost consciousness. He had a cerebral bleed and brainstem compression. Brian spent three months at Nexus Children's Hospital in Houston for rehabilitation therapies. Once home, he went to UMC's Rehabilitation Outpatient Department.

"He came into the clinic pretty much crawling," said Marcela Gomez, Occupational Therapist at UMC Rehab Outpatient and Bryan's primary therapist. "The doctors told him he was never going to walk again without an assistive device and his goal was to prove them wrong."

He required the help of speech therapy and he met Cecilia Amaya, Speech Language

Pathologist, UMC Rehab Outpatient. "We worked on his speech, tone and his flow. His motivation causes him to ask, "What can I do to improve?""

Bryan's mother, Martha, simply sees her son as remarkable.

"He was in a wheelchair when he started therapy," said Martha. "He came in with a cane, a walker and now he is walking. I have been very happy with the therapies from UMC. They have been helping him a lot. He is a miracle."

# Patient Chooses UMC For Successful Cutting Edge Surgery For Rare Cancer



Andi (Andrea) Meece never spent much time in a hospital, except for the births of her two children. In the Summer of 2021, she felt an unusual growth above her mouth. Her dentist sent her to a periodontist who sent her to an oral surgeon, and by early January, was sent for a biopsy.

The biopsy showed a rare form of upper jaw cancer called Sclerosing Odontogenic Carcinoma. Andi and Tom decided to have her surgery at UMC with Dr. Hans Brockhoff, one of the

region's top Head & Neck and Microvascular Reconstructive Surgeons.

"It was our choice to go to UMC," said Andi.

The surgery took 11 to 12 hours on March 11. Dr. Brock declared the surgery a huge success.

"Andrea Meece is an incredibly brave and kind woman," said Dr. Brockhoff. "It was an honor to take care of her and to be able to play a role in helping her overcome her battle with cancer."

# How Pediatrician Dr. Ruben Roncallo Changed Carlito's Way



Sixteen-year-old Carlos Vanegas attends high shool, loves Google Earth and recently began taking culinary arts courses at El Paso Community College. His mother, Laura Villegas, knows how far he has come. As a baby, Carlito would sit and just clap his hands and not look at her.

She took her son to several pediatricians who said nothing was wrong. Someone told her about Dr. Ruben Roncallo at UMC Healthcare Partners Border Pediatrics. She called and Dr. Roncallo said he would help her and not to worry.

Near that time, Laura gave birth to a second son who also had some difficulties. Laura asked Dr. Roncallo to take both sons as patients. Her younger son, Edgar, had "delays".

Dr. Roncallo encouraged Laura to get involved in parent groups. Today, Carlito is in therapy and functioning at a higher level. He only takes medication for ADHD (attention deficit hyperactivity disorder).

"Dr. Roncallo has a big heart, but will also take care of the patient's needs," said Laura. "He told me once, 'You're going to struggle when he's young, so if you stay with therapy, it will be easier," "We're not a statistic anymore."

After Wanda Melendez had cataract surgery, physicians soon discovered a two-inch-by-two-inch brain tumor that required immediate surgery. Wanda was referred to Akshay Gupte, M.D., UMC Neurosurgery and of the southwest's renowned neurosurgeons. Wanda and her husband, Leo, chose Dr. Gupte and UMC.

Dr. Gupte's specialty is in complex spine issues, including spinal cord and brain tumors. He works at UMC with the largest group of neurosurgeons found in El Paso and the west Texas region; all focused on complex and advanced surgeries.

"Dr. Gupte told me I didn't have to go to UMC, that I could go wherever I wanted," said Wanda. "He mentioned MD Anderson, but I didn't want to go there. I wanted to stay here (in El Paso)."

"We are glad we didn't go anywhere else because it has been a great experience for us, and Dr. Gupte has made that happen," said Leo.

Last April, Phil Robinet began to feel ill. He told Sharon, his wife, his jaw, head and arm hurt. They rushed to an emergency room near their westside residence. Even though Phil's vitals were stable, he felt sick.

### El Paso Children's Hospital 10th Birthday






With Dr. Mateo you don't feel like she is rushing you to get out of the room for the next patient. I was very impressed
