Fiscal 2021 was a year of growth and efficiency at University Medical Center of El Paso as our revenues saw positive growth while our departmental directors and operations

teams worked hard to make best and most efficient use of our resources during a full year of the COVID-19 pandemic. It was a year that saw many unique expenses related to the ongoing pandemic.



While we were able to see support from both the State of Texas and the Federal Government, our focus was making the best expenditures that provided the highest level of care for our patients.

Contract labor increased markedly this year due to a large amount of staffing requirements related to the pandemic. The same is true for our expenditures related to supplies and pharmaceuticals. Many of our service lines, from endoscopy to neurosurgery to stroke care and cardiology remained at historically high patient volumes and contributed to continued growth in revenues.


Many of the same increases in revenues at our El Paso Children's Hospital were related to service line growth, patient census and efficient use of resources – especially in the second six months of fiscal 2021. While the pandemic expenses for patient care were not as large as UMC, the Children's Hospital proved its ability to efficiently grow and strengthen its service line revenue streams.

El Paso Health also weathered this most recent year of the pandemic by remaining number one in the market.


Overall, the District's financial health is on pace to reach new heights in Fiscal 2022.

Dear Members, Providers, Employees, and Stakeholders,

Thank you for your interest in El Paso Health and for reviewing our Annual Report for 2021.

This report is designed to highlight our performance over the fiscal year ending October 2021. More detail is within this report, but in summary, El Paso Health maintained its role as market leader with a 58% share of STAR and CHIP membership in the El Paso service delivery area -- 17.8% over our region's competitors. This is especially noteworthy during a year that was challenging on a number of fronts.

Throughout the difficulties of the COVID-19 pandemic and restrictions it created, our leadership team and entire staff worked tirelessly to ensure our Members and their families had continued access to quality



healthcare. That goal remained paramount for us. We also stayed our course of continuous collaboration with our Partners, which remains our focus for improving the region's health care delivery system through collaborative innovation and cost-containment strategies. I am very proud of the entire El Paso Health team.

Over the years, El Paso Health has become one of the most trusted health insurance plans in El Paso. During 2021 we worked hard to solidify and grow that trust. A few of the steps we took during the year for our Members and for our community include:

- Enhanced and increased El Paso Health's Value-Added Products
- Continued our Back-to-School events and gave away 3,030 backpacks to Members
- Distributed over 439,000 pounds of food under our Million Pounds of Hope initiative
- Launched a new Youth Volunteer Program and recruited nineteen high school students. These young adults volunteered over 540 hours and assisted us with our Member newsletter on articles and information about adolescents and mental health well-being.
- Implemented a new STAR Awards Program, recognizing one associate each month for exceptional work and commitment.

These programs, along with our service and product offerings, continued our path of Member growth and enhanced revenue streams. To date, we serve 108,670 Members across all programs and have increased net revenue by 13.4%, compared to the same period in 2020.

In closing, let me add that I am extremely proud of the accomplishments we have made at El Paso Health in 2021. As El Paso's only locally owned managed care organization, our mission is to provide quality health insurance programs to our community. Last year, I believe the entire team at El Paso Health worked with great commitment to accomplish the objectives of that mission. Our partnerships within the El Paso Hospital District will continue to help us expand our reach and serve all our community better – not just with health plans but with giving back to the community through outreach and member-based programs. We look forward to continued progress in 2022.

As the new Executive Director for University Medical Center (UMC) Foundation, El Paso Children's Hospital (EPCH) Foundation, and as the Presidente de la Fundación UMC de México, IASP's Borderless Giving program, I am grateful to serve with the same resilience, courage, persistence, and love as our donors, patients, associates, and community members. I write with an immense amount of gratitude for the city that helped raise me, the city that has helped raise my children. Forging intentional partnerships with other community allies, regional resources, and being mindful about how we serve will be our measure. We will build upon relationships that have defined us; while building new bridges to meet the El Paso County Hospital District's needs for medical equipment, program support, and patient care. Discovering new approaches to honor and engage with our donors, our board members, and the greater community will be central to who we are.

Reflecting on 2021, the University Medical Center Foundation of El Paso (UMC Foundation) continued efforts to secure funding for critical life-saving equipment, patient care support, and service lines, teaching, and research. Assisting University Medical Center (UMC) during a time when the community was facing bed shortages and pandemic-related influx, UMC Foundation, with the help of grants, partnerships, and many donors, stepped up to help meet the unique needs that occurred this last year.

The El Paso Children's Hospital Foundation (EPCH Foundation) helped establish the community's only prediabetes and Type 2 diabetes outpatient clinic. A critical pediatric healthcare challenge along the US-Mexico border became an important and critical task. Hundreds of patients were referred by local pediatricians to ensure intervention was occurring in this very specialized population; additionally, securing the funding to purchase much-needed equipment and quality patient care services for the El Paso Children's Hospital (EPCH) continued to be a priority.

Community programs for UMC and EPCH Foundations proved to be an important resource for El Paso County Hospital patients and their families. During a time when COVID-19 increased financial challenges and access to resources for patients, Project CARE provided medical equipment such as hospital beds, wheelchairs, and walkers to patients in need. Programs such as the Compassionate Care Fund provided patients with medication assistance, utility assistance, food, clothing, and toiletries. Towards the end of this year, the El Paso Health Car Seat Safety program was able to resume its monthly, free car seat events for the community, and provided car seats to patients discharging from both UMC and EPCH.










## STAR AND CHIP MARKET PERFORMANCE NOV 2020 – OCT 2021

# DISTRICT BECOMES LEADER IN PROVIDING VACCINATIONS TO COMMUNITY



Last year propelled us into a worldwide health challenge. The El Paso County Hospital District met that challenge in its commitment to its community. University Medical Center of El Paso rolled up its sleeves and true to its mission to heal, to serve and to educate, tirelessly worked to provide and to develop a highly vaccinated community.

The onset of the availability of the COVID-19 vaccines allowed UMC to step up and create one of two community HUB vaccine sites that began in December of 2020 and culminated in July 2021. This massive effort that began near the height of the pandemic resulted in UMC providing approximately 270,000 vaccinations with combined efforts at its HUB site at the El Paso County Coliseum, UMC Clinics, UMC Mobile Health Clinic, and general patient vaccinations.

For many weeks during this large-scale effort, UMC was able to average up to 3,000 or more vaccinations per day. Combined with simultaneous vaccination efforts by the City of El Paso, other hospitals and healthcare organizations, private physicians, and pharmacies, the borderland soon became one of the most highly vaccinated regions in the State of Texas.

# El Paso Children's Hospital Empowers Children at Risk of Diabetes with New Program

# A YEAR OF HEALING ADVANCEMENTS AT THE DISTRICT

El Paso Children's Hospital (EPCH) has identified a significant need in the community with regards to children who are overweight/obese, at risk for developing prediabetes or type 2 diabetes, or have been diagnosed with prediabetes or type 2 diabetes. EPCH has begun the planning phase to expand services in an outpatient forum that would include outpatient pediatric prediabetes, type 2 diabetes, overweight and obesity medical nutrition therapy services with the creation of the Empower Program.

With the help of the Department of Clinical Nutrition, plans have been devised to bring medical nutrition therapy (MNT) to pediatric patients and their families who are suffering from overweight, obesity, prediabetes, type 2 diabetes, hyperlipidemia, nonalcoholic fatty liver disease (NAFLD), nonalcoholic steatohepatitis (NASH), and disordered eating behaviors. Through outreach sessions with local community pediatricians, it has become apparent that a significant need exists in our community to the extent that the addition of these services to the hospital setting would be beneficial to our community's youngest residents.

The establishment of the new program would allow for pediatric patients and their families to receive patient specific nutritional education by a RD that is customized to meet their child's individual nutritional needs.

#### Where Once Julian was Feeling Deflated, Soon He Soars Back with Access to Education Service

Julian felt a little deflated. Something wasn't right. His parents took him to the doctor, and then to El Paso Children's Hospital where he was diagnosed with Type I Diabetes.

Julian and his family had immediate access to the ONLY American Diabetes Association (ADA) certified pediatric outpatient education service between Phoenix and Austin. Our registered nurses and registered dietitians are certified diabetes educators that specialize in pediatric diabetes education.

With their support, Julian learned how to manage his blood sugar. He was soon back on his skateboard, practicing ollies and grinding at the local park!

The Digestive Health Center at UMC performs a new cutting-edge endoscopic procedure that allows patients to have it done locally and is comparable to a similar procedure taking place at other major endoscopy referral centers nationwide. Known as E-POEM and G-POEM under the umbrella known as third space endoscopy, the procedure falls under endoscopic microsurgeries. This procedure saves patients from more invasive procedures and is specifically used for the management of Zenker's diverticulum, an occurrence when the muscle that divides the throat from the esophagus fails to relax during swallowing.

# **UMC Provides First-Ever Post-COVID Rehab Program**

Recovering from COVID-19 doesn't end when a patient leaves the hospital as residual symptoms affect the ability to return to everyday life. UMC has a program to address these residual symptoms.

The program helps patients recover lung and oxygen capacity and reviews a detailed history of the illness, a specialized assessment of cardiac and respiratory function, exercise capacity, and activity tolerance. In addition, a recovery plan is created to focus on the management of symptoms with the end goal of transitioning patients back into normal life routines.

Patients can contact their doctor and request a referral for the program.


- Spina bifida occulta

# UMC Performs Rare Surgery as Pilot in Plane Crash Proclaims "El Paso is the hidden gem for trauma."



Pilot Adam Schoof, Houston police officer, was walking nine days after his crash.

The March night in 202 I had grown late and dark when two off-duty police officers experienced engine failure in their private airplane, flying thousands of feet above Lordsburg, New Mexico. It was a night that ended at UMC of El Paso. One of the officers who was the pilot, Adam Schoof, had been flying since he was I I years old and was calm as the plane glided silently without power toward the hills near Lordsburg. He had trained for this. But he knew impact with the ground was inevitable as the plane rushed to meet the rocky terrain below.

The two were rescued hours later by US Border Patrol and transported by helicopter to UMC's Scherr Legate Level I Trauma Center, the only Level I Trauma Center in the region. He suffered extensive injuries that required immediate care by UMC's trauma surgeons, neurosurgeons, rehabilitation team, and many others. Adam was walking in 9 days after the crash and in two weeks, he was back in Houston.

"El Paso is the hidden gem for trauma," said Adam.





# First in the City to Allow Routine, In-Person Visits: UMC Receives 2021 Gage Award for COVID-19 Visitation Program

Essential Hospitals, a national trade association which recognized more than 300 hospitals that care for low-income and other marginalized people, recognized University Medical Center of El Paso at its virtual annual conference with a 2021 Gage Award for COVID-19 innovations for its effort to allow family visitation, after restrictions began to lift, for those who were critically ill in the COVID-19 Intensive Care Unit (ICU).

"We were the first in the city to allow routine, in-person visits by family members to critically ill COVID-19 patients," said Eric Johansen, Assistant Chief Nursing Officer and initiator of the program. "I did not want the patients to feel as though they had been forgotten as studies have shown that having a family member by your side, if even for a brief period, helps with recovery and positive outcomes. We did everything possible to keep the family member safe and healthy by providing the proper equipment to make the visits a reality."

# Close-Knit Couple Benefits from COVID-19 Visitation Program

Gil and Blanca Navarette have been married for 37 years. They met as eight-year-olds in Chihuahua and married at 18 on July 24, 1984. As a couple, they are unabashedly inseparable. "We have never been apart," says Gil who owns his own trucking business.

So when both caught the COVID-19 virus in mid-December of 2020, it was a shock when Blanca had to be admitted on Christmas Day to UMC, and no visitors allowed. Gil recovered from the virus, but could only communicate about his wife's status by telephone.

By January, Gil was able to travel to UMC and visit his wife thanks to the COVID-19 Visitation Program. On March 20, Blanca was able to go home. Trained by hospital staff, Gil learned to tend to Blanca as she regained her strength. "I'm with her every day," he says, "I'm thankful I was able to be with her through her long illness and to be able to talk to her, sing to her, and be by her side. I wouldn't have been anywhere else and I am grateful UMC made that possible."





















### **UMC DAISY AWARDS**
