A Message from Michael Nunez,

Reflecting on the financial highlights of the El Paso County Hospital District in 2024, it is evident this past year was a year defined by growth and immense support from our community. This year, the Hospital District achieved total revenues of \$1.4 billion and total assets of \$934 million. This is a strong financial foundation for the future growth of the Hospital District.

As the healthcare needs of our community grew, we responded with increased capacity and services. Compared to 2023, district-wide, our inpatient admissions rose by six percent, our Emergency Department visits increased by three percent, our surgeries grew by nine percent and our outpatient visits expanded by six percent. This year brought significant milestones for the entire Hospital District. El Paso Health not only provided services to 96,450 members, but also launched the STAR+PLUS program, broadening access to specialized care for adults who have disabilities or are 65 years or older.

Our financial outlook remains robust, with a projected revenue budget of \$1.7 billion for 2025, a 21-percent increase over 2024. In the coming year, we will continue to advance the delivery of specialized care through strategic investments and work to introduce Medicare Advantage through El Paso Health in 2026. We are also planning for the successful execution of a \$397 million General Obligation Bond, which was approved by our community in the November election. With the passage of this bond, we look forward to creating El Paso's first Comprehensive Cancer Center, a dedicated burn center, and expanding our capacity with the addition of ICU beds, observation units, surgery rooms and clinics.





We remain the market leader in the El Paso service area for STAR and CHIP, with a 58.4% market share, 20 points higher than our closest competitor. We retained the #1 leadership position, and we did so through the unparalleled dedication of our Board of Directors, leadership, staff, network providers and continual enhancements to our programs. At the end of the fiscal year, across all plans, El Paso Health's total membership stood at over 96,000 members.

El Paso Health is deeply committed to enhancing member health and wellness, with a particular focus on maternal and child health. This commitment is reflected in our high-quality scores, including a 96.75% average across all Performance Improvement Project (PIP) documents over the last three years. Maternal health initiatives have targeted improved outcomes through blood pressure screenings and educational support for pregnant women. Prevention and immunization efforts have also yielded notable results, with El Paso Health ranking 2nd among all 16 Texas Medicaid MCOs for well-child visits, 1st for adolescent immunizations (16 points above the state average), 2nd for childhood immunizations (10 points above the state average), and 2nd in ADHD medication adherence. Additionally, El Paso Health ranks 3rd in postpartum visit adherence, underscoring our commitment to supporting mothers and children across critical health milestones.

El Paso Health remains steadfast in our commitment to providing needed programs and services for our members. We believe that by doing so, and by working in concert with our network of providers, we can be most effective in delivering access to quality healthcare for El Paso's children, families and individuals who need it most. We strive to be the most trusted managed care organization in El Paso. Trust resides in people, and I thank each and every Associate at El Paso Health for going "above and beyond" in their roles of taking care of our members and building that trust. It is with great hope and excitement that I look forward to another successful year in 2025.








STAR & CHIP Market Performance

UMC's Emergency Departments, Clinics Receive Age-Friendly Designations



University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) is proud to announce it has achieved a prestigious Level 3 Geriatric Emergency Department Accreditation (GEDA) from the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP) and a Level 2 Age Friendly designation from the Institute of Healthcare Improvement (IHI) for its Outpatient Clinics.

These designations emphasize UMC's commitment to meeting the highest standards of care for our community's older adult patients. The GEDA program is a national initiative that recognizes hospitals equipped to handle complex health issues among older patients.

To obtain this accreditation, UMC's Emergency Departments at the UMC Main Campus and satellite emergency departments in East and Northeast El Paso, implemented specialized geriatric training for staff and screenings to identify potential risks in patients, such as cognitive impairment and fall risks.

UMC's Emergency Departments offer a safe and comfortable environment with fall-prevention measures in place, as well as a coordinated discharge plan for patients to have a safe transition from our emergency departments to their home.

The UMC East and West Clinic's Level 2 Age Friendly designation means our clinics have also implemented a set of evidence-based interventions specifically designed to improve care for adults 65-years and older.

When it comes to specialized care for your needs, be assured you and your family are in good hands at UMC.





El Paso Children's Hospital Opens Region's First Pediatric Multispecialty Center

El Paso Children's Multispecialty Center, which opened March 4, is the region's most comprehensive multispecialty center within a 350-mile radius that provides care for behavioral and developmental psychiatry, brachial plexus, cranial facial, cystic fibrosis, dermatology, audiology, general surgery, neurosurgery, spina bifida, urology, and vascular abnormalities.

The area's newest state-of-the-art pediatric multispecialty center, a department of El Paso Children's Hospital, houses more than 30 specialists in its 35,000-square-foot facility at 5400 Alameda Ave., Suite B. El Paso Children's Multispecialty Center has 52 exam rooms, including 10 outpatient infusion bays, in-house x-rays, labs, ultrasounds, echocardiograms and much more.

Listening to the needs of the community, this new multispecialty center is here to keep families together at home, while providing them much-needed services. The children in

El Paso and surrounding areas are able to have family support and not worry about the emotional or financial strain caused by traveling for care that was once not available in El Paso.

El Paso Children's Multispecialty Center is prepared to care for more than 20,000 patients annually. With this comprehensive multispecialty center now available, patients who require a team of specialists no longer have to deal with the added financial and emotional strain that comes with seeking a specialized team that used to only exist outside of El Paso.

Its partnership with the University Medical Center of El Paso and Texas Tech Health El Paso provides for each patient to have seamless coordinated care.

Having doctors and medical professionals who specialize in various fields in one facility makes working together efficient and provides comprehensive care for the patients.

UMC Expands Care With New Surgical Hospital In East El Paso

Since opening its doors one year ago, the UMC Surgical Hospital (UMCSH) has performed thousands of surgeries and established three robotic service line programs using the Da Vinci 5, Mako Robotic, and Globus Spine Robot systems.

UMCSH's state-of-the-art technology allows surgeons to integrate the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI), to enhance precision and efficiency, and offer minimally invasive surgeries with a faster, less painful recovery.

In addition to being highly equipped to support complex medical procedures, UMCSH features a cath lab, endoscopy procedure rooms, a radiology department, an inpatient pharmacy and an emergency department. A total of 1,922 surgical procedures, 407 endoscopy cases and 2,326 visits to the UMCSH Emergency Department were reported this year.

Located at 1416 George Dieter, UMCSH provides 40 additional beds for inpatient and outpatient procedures and six operating rooms.

The addition of this hospital has allowed UMC to provide surgical care at a convenient location for patients who no longer have to travel to the main campus for surgeries and has also helped alleviate daily capacity constraints at UMC Main Campus.

Six months after its opening, UMCSH became the first hospital in El Paso to implement the use of an advanced multiport robotic surgical system, called Da Vinci 5, by Intuitive.

This new robotic system introduces "force feedback technology" for soft tissue procedures and allows surgeons to feel subtle forces exerted on tissue during surgery, creating less trauma on the tissue.

Having access to these advanced systems allows UMC to continue offering the community services they otherwise would have to travel out of town for.



UMC's First Deep Brain Stimulation Procedure Successful, Adds New Service Line

University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) successfully completed its first Deep Brain Stimulation (DBS) surgery for patients with neurological conditions that affect mobility, such as Parkinson's disease, in October.

Dr. Harold Smith is trained to perform this treatment for patients with movement disorders and Essential Tremor (ET).

Using sophisticated technology and state-of-the-art equipment, UMC neurosurgeons implanted electrodes in specific areas of the patient's brain to regulate abnormal signals. The patient was awake during the first part of the procedure while the neurosurgeon stimulated the brain with small electric pulses to test the electrode placement. The patient was then asked to perform certain movements to ensure proper positioning.

After the surgery, the pulse generator is programmed by the neurologist to deliver specific impulses to control the patient's symptoms of stiffness, slowness and tremor, significantly improving their quality of life.

UMC continues to work toward providing our region with a wide range of advanced medical services that our community has often had to travel out of town to obtain.

Under the leadership of Dr. J.D. Day, UMC's Medical Director of Neurosurgery, our neurosurgeons are bringing some of the most advanced techniques for treatment of neurological conditions to our Borderland.

A First For UMC: Urological Procedure Using Single Port Robot

El Paso's first urological procedure using the Da Vinci Single Port Robotic System was performed at UMC by Dr. Jesus Herrera-Murillo.

Dr. Murillo successfully performed a partial nephrectomy, which is when part of the kidney is removed, using the SP robotic system.

Robotic surgery has two different platforms: multiport (Da Vinci XI) and single port (Da Vinci SP).

UMC was the first hospital in El Paso to introduce the use of the Da Vinci SP robotic system in 2023. The robotic system gives surgeons the ability to deliver robotic-assisted surgery through a single port, instead of multiple ports, making surgeries less invasive.

The benefits of using the Da Vinci Single Port for a urological procedure is that it results in less incisions, allows for surgeons to stay away from the peritoneal cavity, which is beneficial for patients with pulmonary issues, and provides a less painful, faster recovery for patients.

Other cities have used the Single Port for these types of procedures, but this case was the first time the Single Port was used for a urological procedure in El Paso.

El Pasoans Approve \$396.6 Million Bond For UMC's Healthcare Expansion

El Paso voters approved a \$396.6 million bond for University Medical Center (UMC) of El Paso with 65% support on the November ballot. The bond will fund critical expansions and enhancements at UMC, aiming to fill healthcare gaps and meet growing patient needs in the region.

Key Projects Funded by the Bond:

1. UMC Campus Improvements

One-third of bond funds will be used to enhance UMC's ability to meet capacity needs and add new technology to imaging and operating room facilities.

2. Comprehensive Cancer Center

The first of its kind in the region, UMC will partner in building a comprehensive cancer center that will allow patients to seek treatment closer to home.

3. Burn Center Development

El Paso lacks a local burn care program, and patients are often transferred out of the city for specialized care. The bond will increase care capability by adding additional operating rooms, critical care beds, and enhanced burn care units.

4. Expansion of Healthcare Access Points

To accommodate the growing population and increasing healthcare demands, the bond will expand access points across the region. This effort is aimed at making preventative and acute care more accessible for patients across the region.

The bond will increase property taxes by approximately \$6 per month for an average El Paso homeowner. Funds will strictly cover the construction and equipment costs for the projects, without being used for staff salaries or ongoing operations.





UMC Receives Reverification as Level 1 Trauma Center

Once again, University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) received reverification of its Level 1 Trauma Center by the American College of Surgeons

The UMC Scherr Legate Level 1 Trauma Center is the only Level 1 Trauma Center in a 270-mile radius of El Paso, recognized within the Texas and New Mexico Trauma Systems.

Since 2001, UMC's Scherr Legate Level 1 Trauma Center has been distinguished by the immediate full availability of specialized personnel, equipment and services to treat the most severe and critical injuries.

Being a Level 1 Trauma Center means UMC remains committed to maintaining a full-range of specialties and resources available 24-hours a day.

This achievement recognizes a trauma center's dedication to providing the highest level of care for injured patients.

From life-saving surgeries to critical emergency care, UMC serves as our community's lifeline.

EPCHD Associates Thanked For Their Work During Pandemic

University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) recognized the healthcare heroes who were with us continuously from the day we received our first COVID-19 patient through the five year anniversary of the pandemic. The names of those who tirelessly worked to provide the Borderland community with extensive care during the COVID-19 pandemic were unveiled on a memorial wall on March 4.


As COVID-19 cases began surging in El Paso in March 2020, UMC became the foremost hospital to transform virtually every floor into a COVID unit. Patient rooms were converted to negative pressure rooms to prevent pathogens from flowing to noncontaminated areas.

To meet the demand of patients admitted with COVID-19, military grade tents were established to expand capacity, and an ICU visitation program was created to provide patients' family members with daily updates from medical staff. Most notable were UMC's efforts to provide vaccinations for the El Paso community.

In 2021, the UMC Mobile Health Clinic made receiving the COVID-19 vaccine easier in El Paso County by allowing the vaccines to be safely transported to pop-up vaccination sites for eligible and pre-registered residents to receive their COVID-19 vaccine, without making a trip to the city.

To date, UMC, along with partners at its vaccination sites at the El Paso County Coliseum, UMC Clinics, and the UMC Mobile Health Clinic, vaccinated over 360,000 patients. As we did during the years that followed a surge of COVID-19 cases, UMC continues to work tirelessly to save the lives of those who are infected with the virus or living with the long-term effects of it.

Thank you to our healthcare heroes for answering the call during the pandemic. Your commitment and dedication does not go unnoticed.





UMC's Nurse Residency Program Looks To Strengthen Workforce

To celebrate the 10-year anniversary of UMC's Nurse Residency Program (NRP), a 12-month comprehensive transition-to-practice program for graduate nurses, UMC bgean working to attain Practice Transition Accreditation Program (PTAP) accreditation from the American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC). The accreditation is expected to happen within the next two years. Last year featured the program's largest cohort, with 39 students. To date, 606 nurses have gone

through UMC's Nurse Residency Program, which boasts a 93% retention rate. In order to reach this accreditation, UMC has created an advisory committee comprised of college deans and representatives from UTEP, TTUHSC, EPCC, Southwest University and Western Technical College. The first meeting to launch the collaboration was held on Jan. 17 and will continue with quarterly meetings to discuss how to create a seamless transition from school into the workforce.

Donation Honors Dr. Jimenez's Legacy At UMC, EPCH

A pioneer in neurosurgery, Dr. David F. Jimenez's legacy will continue to change the lives of countless patients and families through the innovative work he left behind and the influence he made on neurosurgeons who continue using his surgical techniques to treat craniosynostosis. On Jan. 10, a memorial plaque was unveiled above Operating Room #4 in Dr. Jimenez's honor. Jimenez's wife, Lisa Bishop Jimenez, gifted \$50,000 to initiate the Dr. David F. Jimenez Memorial Fund through the El Paso Children's Foundation. The memorial fund will help continue Dr. Jimenez's mission of training the next generation of neurosurgeons who can perform the Endoscopic-Assisted Craniotomy surgery he developed throughout his 30-year career. "David had a vision of making something very great in El Paso. He pushed for things to grow and he was here for a purpose, to make us cutting edge," said Jacob Cintron, President & CEO El Paso County Hospital District. Dr. Jimenez was the Director for the Department of Neurosurgery at University Medical Center of El Paso and Medical Director of Neurosurgery and Chair of the Department of Neurosciences at El Paso Children's Hospital from 2019 until his sudden passing on May 25, 2023. Known nationally and internationally as an ingenious surgeon, Dr. Jimenez's arrival to El Paso marked a great milestone for El Paso families who no longer had to leave the community for pediatric neurosurgery. He is credited with expanding UMC and EPCH's neurosurgery practice.

ICU Nurses Awarded DAISY Team Award For Providing Life-Saving Care To Teen


Jessica Arellanes was seventeen when she was hit by a car while riding her bike home from work one night in Carlsbad, New Mexico. That incident in May 2023 left her with injuries so severe, she had to be airlifted to UMC. "As I walked through the hospital doors, I found my daughter laying in that bed and my heart sank. She was unconscious, intubated, a ventilator breathing for her," said Jessica's father, Cesar Arrellanes. "I felt a kind of desperation that I've never felt in my life." Arrellanes said the trauma Jessica suffered caused a stroke. She underwent an eight and a half hour surgery on her left leg and pelvis and spent 35 days in the ICU requiring constant attention from UMC's Multidisciplinary ICU Team. Arrellanes said he was deeply moved by the care his daughter received from Steven Saenz, RN; Diana Lopez, RN; Fernanda Nevarez RN; Carolina Urbina, RN; Hugo Acosta Gasson, RN; Matthew Contreras, RN; Ashley Marinussen, RT: ICU and the physicians and surgeons who oversaw her case

"These silent heroes unknowingly put on the cape and go to battle against death itself," said Arrellanes. "I heard a quote one day while watching a movie 'to mend the broken and make the weak strong again.' I believe that is the mission these extraordinary human beings carry out each and every day as they walk through the doors of the hospital and head to the ICU." Nearly a year later, Jessica's recovery is ongoing and she has regained the ability to walk. The Multidisciplinary ICU Team has since received UMC's first ever DAISY Team Award for their efforts to save Jessica's life. The DAISY Team Award recognizes that while an idea to achieve better patient and family outcomes may start with one individual, it often takes an entire team to successfully implement. The DAISY Team Award is designed to honor collaboration by two or more people, led by a nurse, who identify and meet patient and/or patient family needs by transcending the traditional role of nursing. Thank you to our Multidisciplinary ICU Team for the attentive, compassionate care and kindness you provide to our patients and their families!



UMC Introduces Da Vinci 5 Robot For Soft Tissue Surgical Procedures

University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) became the first hospital in El Paso to implement the use of an advanced multiport robotic surgical system, called Da Vinci 5, by Intuitive, for soft tissue procedures in June. This new robotic system introduces "force feedback technology," which allows surgeons to feel subtle forces exerted on tissue during surgery, creating less trauma on the tissue. The Da Vinci 5 robot uses cutting-edge data analytics to provide surgeons with high-quality 3D imaging and also has the capacity to incorporate Artificial Intelligence (AI). Having access to these types of advanced systems allows UMC to continue offering the community services they otherwise would have to travel out of town for.





UMC Introduces New Mako Robot For Less Invasive Surgeries

University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) continues its commitment to the community with the addition of a new state-of-the-art robotic system for hip and knee replacements. The Stryker Mako Robotic-Arm, for more accurate and precise joint replacements, is now being used at UMC Surgical Hospital to provide patients with less invasive options. The Mako robot assists surgeons in creating a joint replacement that is near normal and functional by tailoring implants to the patient's anatomy. Surgeons obtain real-time feedback and cues from the Mako Robotic-Arm during surgery, which allow surgeons to make adjustments to the surgical plan, if needed.

UMC's Electrical Plant Receives Boost With Funding For Equipment

Uninterrupted power is essential at any hospital. At UMC, generators comprise the power-producing heart of the hospital, providing high-pressure steam, cooling and emergency power systems for the entire hospital. "The generators at UMC have exceeded their recommended durability of 20 years," said Ivan Cabrera, Supv. Power Plant for UMC's Engineering Dept. "We've done a great job taking preventative measures to maintain the system." UMC's aging generators will be getting a boost thanks to Congresswoman Veronica Escobar of Texas who presented the

hospital with a \$1.3 million check to go toward the replacement of UMC's 2.5MW emergency generator and the addition of power storage and solar capacity for the hospital. The \$1.3 million is part of \$19 million in federal funds Congresswoman Escobar was able to secure through the federal Community Project Funding process for various El Paso improvement projects. This upgrade will ensure a more resilient future for UMC to continue providing the highest-quality of care for our community.



Nurse's Testimony Helps Bring Justice To High-Profile Case In New Mexico

Karla Salazar, Certified Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) RN, was recognized by the Federal Investigations Bureau (FBI) in New Mexico for her testimony in the trial of a former high-level El Paso school district employee and former middle and elementary school teacher charged with kidnapping and sexually assaulting an El Paso woman.

Salazar's testimony and expertise as a SANE resulted in the perpetrator getting 30 years in prison.

"Ms. Salazar showed the victim immense compassion during one of the scariest times in the victim's life. She also testified masterfully at trial about her expertise in conducting SANE exams and about the SANE exam she conducted on the case," the FBI noted at a Law Enforcement Awards Ceremony.

University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) has seven SANEs certified in pediatric, adult and adolescent exams.

"To conduct a sexual assault exam is not easy for the patient, the family or even the SANE because the victim has gone through so much already and they don't want to talk about it," explained Gloria Salazar, UMC's Trauma Education Prevention and SANE Manager. "Karla's documentation and her testimony resulted in a good outcome. This is one in a million, and I hope we see more of this outcome because not all cases go to court."

UMC is the only local hospital to offer a SANE 24/7, something Salazar credits UMC's CEO for.

"We are thankful to Jacob Cintron because when he became CEO of UMC in 2017, he granted the full SANE program 24/7 and we are honored and lucky that we have a full SANE program for patients in our region, which covers parts of Texas, New Mexico and Mexico.

UMC's SANE program is available for anyone who may have questions about sexual assault, domestic violence or human trafficking. You can ask to speak to a SANE at UMC's Emergency Department.



West Texas Poison Center Celebrates 30 Years

What began as a small center that would only receive a couple of calls a day has grown to answering more than 85 calls a day regarding accidental medication poisonings, snake bites, insect stings and poisonous plants, on a daily basis.

A vital resource for our community, the West Texas Poison Center (WTPC) is celebrating 30 years of providing toxicology consultations that help avoid unnecessary trips to the emergency department and in some instances, saving lives. On Sept. 1, 1994, WTPC began its operation at the R.E. Thomason General Hospital Inpatient Pharmacy, a year after the Texas Legislature established the Texas Poison Control Network. Three years later, The WTPC became the first bilingual (English and Spanish) poison center accredited by the American Association of Poison Control Centers.

Today, the WTPC is a comprehensive 24-hour poison center offering services to the public and healthcare professionals from across 36 counties of West Texas, to include El Paso, Midland/Odessa and San Angelo.

In 2023, WTPC accomplished an enormous feat, becoming 100-percent certified by the American Association of Poison Control Centers.

"Our Poison Center hotline is a vital resource not only for the residents of West Texas, but to the many healthcare professionals who also call us for advice and guidance with their patients," said Dr. Salvador Baeza, Director of UMC's WTPC. "We look forward to serving our community for many more years." The WTPC is an active teaching site for residents, interns and students from Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso, The University of Texas at El Paso's School of Pharmacy and William Beaumont Army Medical Center.

"It is incredible to me that something like this has been around for so long and has so much support from our facility, state, and federal government," said Isabel Fuerte-Hernandez, Poison Information Specialist. "I think there are a few places that have such universal support and are very accessible to the public, so I am happy to be a part of this team."

University Medical Center of El Paso's newest Endocrinology Department is expanding access to a new service line specializing in diagnosing and treating conditions related to the endocrine system.

Some of the services provided by the endocrinology practice, located at the UMC Northeast Clinic, include treatment for diabetes, pituitary and thyroid disorders, menopause, and bone diseases.

As part of this new addition, UMC welcomed its newest endocrinologist, Dr. Juan Castillo, who brings 18 years of healthcare experience to UMC.

Originally from Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, Dr.
Castillo earned his medical degree from Universidad Autónoma de Santo Domingo. He completed his internal medicine residency at South Brooklyn Health in New York, followed by an Endocrinology, Diabetes, and Metabolism Fellowship.



UMC Once Again Recognized For Achieving Meritorious Outcomes For Surgical Patient Care


University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) was once again deemed meritorious in outcomes of inpatient and outpatient surgical procedures by The American College of Surgeons National Surgical Quality Improvement Program (ACS NSQIP®).

The ACS NSQIP recognition program commends a select group of hospitals for achieving a meritorious composite score in either an "All Cases" category or in a "High Risk" case category, both of which UMC received recognition based on data from 2023.

Nationwide, 77 hospitals received this meritorious distinction, of which, UMC was among 32 hospitals to receive the distinction

for two or more consecutive years and among 43 hospitals who were recognized for meritorious outcomes in both categories.

The goal of ACS NSQIP is to reduce surgical morbidity, surgical mortality, and to provide a firm foundation for surgeons to apply what is known as the "best scientific evidence" to the practice of surgery.









UMC Foundation Program Educates Parents On Car Seat Safety For Children

Sylvia Flores' life changed when a car crash she was involved in sent her son, Gael, to the El Paso Children's Hospital with two broken femurs. Flores said her son, who was 23 months at the time, was buckled into his car seat at the time of the crash, but because the seat was not properly installed, the car seat did not protect him as it should have. "Me as a new mother, I had no idea how car seats needed to be buckled in, in order for them to stay in place," said Flores. Gael's injuries required him to be in a spica cast, a special type of cast that helps realign femur fractures. This new cast required a special car seat once her son was released from the hospital. "Thankfully, the [UMC Foundation's El Paso Health Car Seat Safety Program] helped me with a special car seat to make sure my child would travel safely while he was in the cast," Flores said. She believes if she had known about this program sooner, it could have helped prevent the severity of the injuries her son had from the crash. "This program has had such an impact on my life," she said. "Had I known how car seats function, perhaps nothing would have ever happened to my baby, but thank God my son is still with us and nothing worse happened." The UMC Foundation's El Paso Health Car Seat Safety Program has educated thousands of parents, like Flores. Every month, the program offers parents in the community the opportunity to have their child's car seat evaluated by a certified child passenger safety technician. The tech may recommend a free replacement if needed, and provide instruction on proper installation, according to Texas Child Transportation Safety Laws. Thus far, the program has provided 4,508 car seats, to include car seats for special needs, to children at UMC, El Paso Children's Hospital, Del Sol Medical Center and Las Palmas Medical Center. 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EPH Partners with UMC Foundation for Eighth Year of Car Seat Safety program

In September, the UMC Foundation kicked off the 11th year of its Car Seat Safety program with a check ceremony and reception held at El Paso Health's offices. With its \$60,000 donation, El Paso Health committed to its eighth straight year of partnership with the foundation to make this vital program an ongoing success. Over the course of the last year, the Car Seat Safety Program has served 379 families and 617 children by providing installation instruction and child passenger safety education. In addition, 539 car seats have been provided to children in need, including car seats specially designed for children with special needs upon discharge from the hospital. This program is a shining example of a strong, effective partnership crafted within our El Paso County Hospital District.




EPH Medicare Advantage Grows Membership Over 400%



Over the last year, El Paso Health has grown its Medicare Advantage enrollment by over 400%, from 93 to over 500 members. One factor in that success has been the significant growth in the network of local brokers who are selling El Paso Health's MA plan. The EPH MA team has grown their community of brokers from 50 to 150 during calendar year 2024, and - in preparation for Medicare's Annual Enrollment Period and another year of growth - the Medicare Advantage team hosted their largest-ever Broker Kick-Off Meeting in September.

PAM Health, UMC Celebrate One Year Of Joint Venture With New Robots

University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) and PAM Health Rehabilitative Hospital celebrated the one year anniversary of a joint venture, which was established May 2023, by introducing two state-of-the-art robots. The Balo Dynamic Standing Frame and Tigo Motor-assisted Cycling Trainer, by Thera Trainer, can assist in the rehabilitation of patients who are recovering from a stroke, orthopedic surgery or an accident. With the use of virtual gaming software, the Balo Dynamic Standing Frame is able to aid in strengthening patients' balance, coordination, and sensory reintroduction. A patient is strapped into the frame and faces a screen with virtual therapeutic gaming. The shock absorbers on the frame help patients shift their body weight in order to maneuverer the game, without the risk of falling. The Tigo Motor-assisted Cycling Trainer can be used with a chair or wheelchair to facilitate movement of the upper and lower extremities and improve motor skills. This training device allows patients with limited mobility to exercise with assistance from the robotic features on the pedals. PAM Health has seen over 400 rehabilitation patients since the joint venture began with UMC.



El Paso Health launches new STAR+PLUS Plan

After over a year of training and preparation, on Sept. 1, El Paso Health (EPH) officially welcomed over 9,500 members to its new STAR+PLUS program. EPH associates rallied to provide these members the smoothest-possible transition from their previous plans and – most importantly – to ensure complete continuity of care. Some indicators of that tremendous effort include:

- EPH's Service Coordinators conducted over 6,000 initial outreach and welcome calls during the month of September.
- Member Services received over 14,000 incoming calls in the first four weeks of September, of which nearly 6,000 are from STAR+PLUS members. In addition, nearly 100 walk-ins have been welcomed at EPH's front desk.
- Acute authorizations jumped by 25%, from 800 per week to 1,000.

It is expected that this new membership itself will increase El Paso Health gross revenue by over 50% in Fiscal 2025. STAR+PLUS is also expected to drive significant growth for EPH's Medicare DSNP plan, because many STAR+PLUS members are dual-eligible for both Medicaid and Medicare.

Of course, EPH leadership made sure to celebrate and recognize everyone's hard work with a STAR+PLUS Fiesta on Sept. 11.



EPH's Commitment To Community Sponsorships, Support

El Paso Health's Community Sponsorship committee continuously seeks out like-minded partners who recognize and strive to fill the unmet needs in our El Paso Community. The inspiring work of these selfless organizations remind us that even small donations or a few hours of volunteerism can change the lives of those less fortunate than we.

Some examples from 2023-24 include:

Sparks Housing Development Hygiene Closet – Recognizing an overlooked need, the Sparks Housing Development initiated a Hygiene closet to help provide new and unused toiletries to low-income residents. Resident have access to this Hygiene closet twice per month.

Ronald McDonald House – Sponsorship monies are used to provide services and programs to families in crisis. Last year, the Ronald McDonald House served 191 families and over 7,000 visitors to their Family Rooms at THOP Children's Hospital in El Paso and Memorial Medical Center in Las Cruces.

Sleep in Heavenly Peace – Donations and volunteers build and provide beds to children ages 3-17 who might otherwise be sleeping on the floor or in other uncomfortable conditions. Children without a suitable sleeping environment are more susceptible to sleep disturbances and are at a higher risk of developing mental health issues.

El Paso Center for Diabetes – Sponsorships fund a variety of programs to build awareness of Diabetes and to help El Pasoans manage this all-too-common condition. Testing, education, therapies, and support are available through this valuable local resource.

Mother Gives Thanks To UMC, Finds Will To Live After Crash

Rosalia Mercado's story is proof that during our weakest moments, strength can come from within. She discovered this power on March 7, 2010, after the vehicle she was in flipped several times, ejected her and changed her life at 18 years old. Just nine months after having her first child, Rosalia had found herself in critical condition, her injuries so severe, she was transported to University Medical Center of El Paso for treatment. "Visibly there were no injuries," said Rosalia. "There was no blood nor bruises, but I was not able to move, and I was losing consciousness." For nine months, doctors and nurses at UMC worked tirelessly to stabilize Rosalia and keep her alive. The crash had caused her cervical spine to shatter and her lungs to collapse. "There was a time when no one knew if I would make it." Rosalia recalled. She paused then said, "Eventually, I was diagnosed as a C4-C5 quadriplegic, paralyzed from the chest down." Nonetheless, Rosalia went back to school in 2017, received her Associate of Arts degree from EPCC and started a virtual assistance and social media management business. This spring, Rosalia has enrolled in a bachelor's degree program to continue her education, inspiring her son, Dominic, to do anything he sets his mind to, despite any limitations. "Through it all, motherhood remains the greatest joy of my life. Those early years were tough on both of us. He could not understand why mommy was not there, but when I was stable enough, he would cuddle up next to me in my hospital bed. His presence gave me strength." Rosalia said she has never let any limitations hold her back from being the best mom she could possibly be. She and her family now live every day with meaning, strength and faith. She is filled with gratitude toward her family, who supported her through those early years, and for the healthcare professionals at UMC who not only helped save her life, but cared for her and made sure she was comfortable throughout the pain and uncertainty. Rosalia's story is an inspiration to many, especially her sister, Claudia Mercado, who pursued a career in the healthcare field after Rosalia's experience and currently serves as Administrative Director.



UMC Patient Makes Strong Recovery After Suffering Sudden Stroke

After suffering a sudden stroke, Alfred Camacho spent a month recovering at University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC). On June 6, he went to PAM Health Rehabilitation Hospital of El Paso, a UMC partner for rehabilitation, and received intensive rehab to rebuild his strength and function. By June 25, Camacho had made significant progress and was able to walk again, using a front-wheeled walker, and go home. Although he knows he still has work ahead of him, Camacho is excited to return to all that he was doing before his stroke. "I walked, I went further, I stood up longer, I even got in trouble because I was on my walker going all around the hospital. I did it!" he said. He expressed his gratefulness for his case manager and therapists, Melissa, Olga, Eddie, and Peggy, who helped him exceed all of his initial goals.



Family Finds Hope For Daughter At El Paso Children's Hospital

At 12 weeks gestation, Anely Olacio's mom was unsure of her future.

"I knew something was not normal with my baby 12 weeks into my pregnancy," said Wendy, Anely's mother.

Wendy did not know what was wrong with her baby until she was seven months pregnant. She was told her daughter had Osteogenesis Imperfecta (brittle bone disease). Osteogenesis Imperfecta (OI), is a connective tissue disease that causes the body to make less collagen, resulting in fragile bones that can easily be broken.

When Anely was born, she had countless fractures all over her body and her skull was not fully formed. Wendy had friends and family who had recommended she get care at El Paso Children's Hospital (EPCH). There are different types of OI, so initially the family believed she may eventually outgrow the disease.

"People told us El Paso Children's Hospital had the best pediatric doctors in El Paso," said Wendy. "We immediately found an orthopedic surgeon and a few other specialists at El Paso Children's Hospital. All the doctors were focused on improving Anely's quality of life."

As Anely grew, the bone on her head grew as she began to grow. She spent the first few years in and out of the hospital receiving infusions to help her regain strength. Doctors were still uncertain if Anely would ever walk.

When Anely was two, doctors diagnosed her with Hydrocephalus, which is the buildup of fluid in ventricles deep within the brain.

"With the fluid in her brain she needed another surgery," said Wendy.


Now, Anely has three specialists that coordinate her care and health.

"All of Anely's doctors are very attentive," Wendy said. "The doctors, nurses, therapists, respiratory team, everyone we see is very attentive and provided for her very well. I have trust in the hospital and all the workers."

Today, Anely enjoys a good quality of life, and her mother says she is very happy. She does not typically spend many days in the hospital now, but she still undergoes treatments every six months and to her doctor's awe, she can walk with assistance from a walker.



Local, Specialized Care At El Paso Children's Hospital Changed Future For El Paso Family



Jorge Campa was born at 25 weeks gestation, 15 weeks before his parents were expecting him. After he was born, he spent a few weeks in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU), but appeared to be healthy and growing as expected.

"After being released from the NICU, we went home and soon after, I could tell that his muscle tone didn't seem normal," said Rosario, Jorge's mom. "His primary care doctor suggested physical therapy, but his physical therapist felt we should see a neurologist to give him a thorough exam."

Jorge's parents quickly got him to a neurologist, although, at the time, there was only one in El Paso. That appointment was 17 years ago.

"The neurologist diagnosed him with Cerebral Palsy and explained to us what Jorge's future may look like," said Rosario.

Life for Jorge and his family has not been easy. In addition to Cerebral Palsy, he was later diagnosed with Epilepsy. His parents, brother and sister have learned to adapt to whatever situation may arise, which, at the time, meant Jorge and his mother would have to travel a great distance to get Jorge the care he needed.

"Jorge never understood why his brother, sister and dad could not be at the hospital with us," said Rosario. "All of us have made sacrifices so that Jorge could get the care he needed."

However, that was not the case with his most recent surgery at El Paso Children's Hospital (EPCH). This time, Jorge could stay close to home, where his whole family was able to come together to help him through the surgery.

Jorge has had several surgeries and treatments over the years to help improve his quality of life, but specialists at EPCH felt he would be a good candidate for selective dorsal rhizotomy (SDR). SDR is a surgical procedure to permanently reduce spasticity (muscle tightness), common with Cerebral Palsy.

"To have a team of doctors that can all care for him during one visit or appointment means a lot for a family like ours," said Rosario. "It is a time saver, and it gives us the answers we are looking for and provides a clear treatment plan for the future."

The SDR surgery was a success, and Jorge's family continues to work with all of Jorge's specialists to make sure he lives his best possible life.

Olavio never let his cancer diagnosis test his faith

Olavio Hernandez was 14 years old when he first got his cancer diagnosis.

"I thought our world was going to come crashing down," said Carmen, Olavio's mother. "The whole family was scared and worried."

After the initial diagnosis, Olavio's doctors ordered tests to see how advanced the cancer was and let the family know the treatment options available for him. One of the options presented was removing the affected leg.

"I did not want to see Olavio lose his leg," Carmen said. "We began searching for the right doctor who could potentially save Olavio's leg."

The first doctor they saw was in Colorado. Carmen explained the doctor there was young and did not have the experience they wanted for Olavio's treatment. Luckily, that doctor referred them to a doctor in El Paso. They had their next appointment with Dr. Rajiv Rajani, an orthopedic oncology specialist at El Paso Children's Hospital (EPCH).

"The first treatment Dr. Rajani recommended radiation," said Carmen. "The radiation was a painful experience for Olavio and unfortunately it did not work. In fact, the cancer gained strength."

After the radiation treatment, Dr. Rajani explained that amputation of the leg would give Olavio the best chance to beat cancer.

After the surgery, the family was expecting a long recovery. To their surprise, Olavio was discharged from the hospital in less than five days. His mother feels his ability to put things into God's hands is amazing. She commends his strength, willpower, and his faith.

"Olavio had trust in Dr. Rajani from the beginning," she said.

"He met other doctors he did not want to see again. From the moment he met Dr. Rajani, he knew we could trust him."

She emphasized his experience, and his open communication gave them confidence in the surgery and recovery process. "Dr. Rajani treated us like family," Carmen said. "Olavio has survived three times. One cannot fight against God's designs. He put us in the path of Dr Rajani. God will always put the people who need to be there in your path."

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At a time where life stood still for me, and uncertainty was the only thing I could feel your Charitable care grant gave me some piece of mind and feeling that someone cared about what I was going through.

As a very independent person I have always taken care of myself financially. With my breast cancer diagnosis early last year the last thing I was thinking about was how my life was going to be impacted financially. In the beginning of the entire treatment process, I felt many doors closed for me as I did not qualify for many services because of the fact I live alone, I no longer have any dependents living with me and my income was enough to sustain me. Yet my employment hours had to be cut short because of the many procedures and treatments I had to go through. From chemotherapy, mastectomy and radiation my medical bills/copayments went so high I had to start prioritizing my bills. During this time all you want and pray is to have a positive outcome and a good prognosis.

When I was offered the grant my first reaction and my response to the person that contacted me was that I wouldn't qualify. I explained to her I didn't qualify for anything, yet she told me to turn in all required documents and they would follow the process for the grant, So I did.

I truly appreciate and I am forever grateful to have been a recipient of your grant. It helped me tremendously financially during a time when I was running out of options. I remember clearly it was on a Saturday morning early January 2024 when I picked up my mail from the mailbox. There was a letter from the hospital, and as I always do, I opened it to categorize it in my organizational basket and to my surprise it was not a bill but a check for me from your grant. It was like God had heard my prayers the night before. I sat on my couch and started to cry because I was at a point where I had no more options.

I am so grateful and thankful we have organizations like yours that make a difference in people's life that are going through this type of difficult situations. All I have gone through and endured has been a life lesson to me. I hope your organization continues to make a difference in people's life and my testimony can be one of many. Again, I am truly grateful and thank every single one of the people who contributed as it was a blessing in my life.
